The Annual Global Summit

The One Young World Summit 2018 was held in The Hague, The Netherlands.

Known as 'the International City of Peace and Justice', The Hague is the seat of the Dutch parliament, home to the U.N.'s International Court of Justice, headquartered in the Peace Palace, and the International Criminal Court.. The 9th annual One Young World Summit was officially opened by Queen Maxima of The Netherlands who welcomed delegates from 196 countries alongside global leaders, renowned experts and the world's press.'

The Summit convened more than 1,800 delegates from every country to debate and devise solutions to the world's most pressing issues. Marking the 70th Anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, particular focus was given to the continued need to protect and uphold the basic rights and dignity of all people.

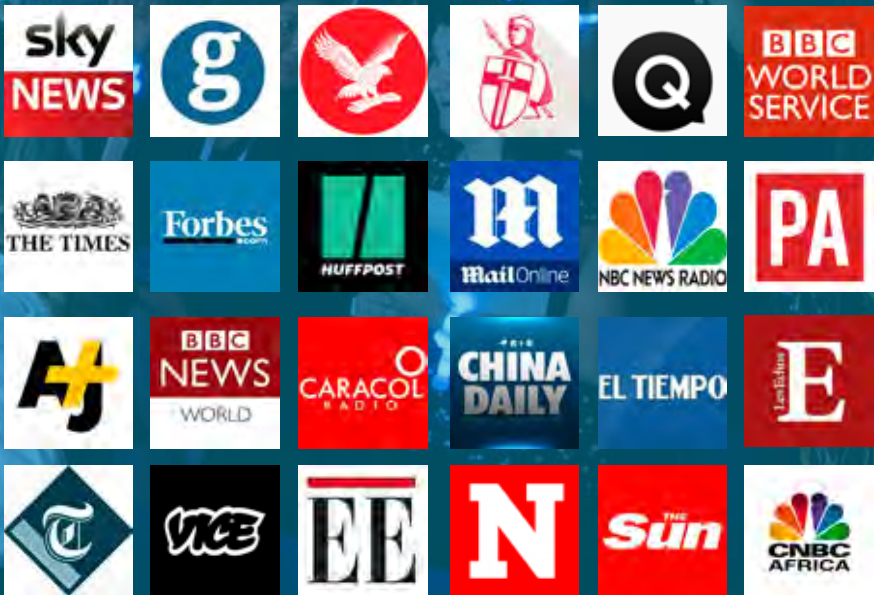

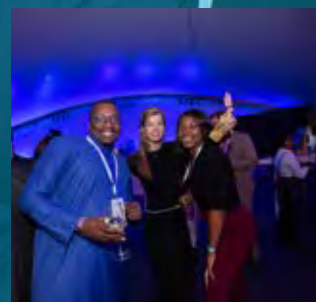

HUMAN RIGHTS – SDGS: WHERE DO HUMAN RIGHTS FIT IN?



Keynote Speaker



KUMI NAIDOO
Secretary-General of Amnesty International

As the International City of Peace and Justice, The Hague is home to the International Criminal Court (ICC). With over 120 signatories, the ICC is one of the few global bodies holding governments accountable for their actions.

Yet according to Amnesty International “the world witnessed a rollback of human rights” in 2017. It stated that “women’s rights took a nosedive” in many countries, while there was a simultaneous rise in xenophobia and discrimination towards minority groups.

Of the One Young World Ambassadors surveyed, 69% have witnessed a human rights violation in their country, and nearly half had personally suffered from one. To combat this One Young World Ambassadors are leading initiatives which have impacted on 137,723 people in tackling inequalities and providing new opportunities for disadvantaged groups. A further 207,774 people have been educated and engaged by One Young World Ambassador projects in building more peaceful and inclusive societies.

The SDGs seem all encompassing and 90% of the goals are linked to human rights, underpinned by the fundamental commitment to “leave no one behind”. But with the state of global politics in 2018, could more be done to reflect human rights more explicitly in the SDGs?

WILL THE INTERNET ACHIEVE EQUALITY IN EDUCATION?



Keynote Speaker

The global youth unemployment rate is on the rise again. The UN's International Labour Organization predicts that numbers will increase by 200,000 in 2018 to a total of 71.1 million (more than 13%). After several years of improvement from the crisis peak of 76.7 million youth employed in 2009, the problem is again getting worse.

In addition, more than 160 million working youths in the developing world are living on pay of less than \$3.10 a day. Almost 90% of all young people live in developing countries.

There is a widespread assumption that youth unemployment and conflict are directly related, with a lack of economic opportunity associated with greater vulnerability to participation in armed violence, crime and other illicit activities.

One Young World Ambassador-led projects are alleviating poverty and developing the economy by providing access to training, education and employment opportunities. Yet young people are three times as likely to be unemployed as adults, and in 76% of countries with data more than one in ten youths are neither in education nor working.

If we do not create the 600 million jobs needed for young people in the next decade, how can we deal with the ramifications?

CAN SOLVING YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT AVERT FUTURE CONFLICTS?



Almost ten years ago, the UN announced the world's first tuition-free online university, designed to use the Internet to bring further education to the masses requiring only an admission fee of \$50 or less. The University continues to exist and has recently had further support from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

According to Save The Children, more than half of the world's school-aged children are not learning. Roughly 750 million people over the age of 15 still can't read or write a basic sentence. With \$8.15 billion invested in edtech companies globally in 2017 alone, there is newfound hope of providing more accessible forms of education to those that need it most.

One Young World Ambassador initiatives are using online technology to close the opportunities gap between men and women, and between developing and developed societies. Projects have educated 108,150 students, providing employable skills and training.

But are we doing enough to exploit the wonders of the world wide web for the benefit of better educating the global population?

HOW CAN OUR PLANET SURVIVE PLASTIC POLLUTION?

Brighton is the Executive Director of Agents of Change Foundation and is the CEO of KIDS FM. A pioneer in the field, he has used the radio to raise awareness about environmental concerns and threats in Zambia.

Madhav founded Green the Gene when he was 8 years old. Since then, the organisation has grown into one of the world's largest youth run environmental non profits, with projects in 62 different countries.

Ismael founded Madiba & Nature in 2016 with the goal of reducing plastic waste. One of the projects he has led is ECOBOAT which creates fishing boats out of plastic bottles to support the local economy and environment.

In the past decade the world produced more plastic than in the whole of the last century. We buy 1 million plastic bottles every minute and use 17 million barrels of oil each year just to produce those plastic bottles.

Each year 13 million tonnes of plastic leak into the ocean. Some of these plastics can survive in the environment for 500 years.

According to the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, if big industry doesn't clean up its act, there will be more plastic waste in the sea than fish by 2050. A single mass of trash floating in the Pacific Ocean, dubbed the 'Great Pacific Garbage Patch' has grown to three times the size of France. As the organisation A Plastic Planet regularly states; "we are all Plastic Addicts".

To turn this around 69% of One Young World Ambassadors have personally taken steps to be more responsible in the consumption and disposal of plastics in their country. Recycling offers hope. Every ton of recycled plastic saves up to 2,000 gallons of gasoline and the process uses 88 per cent less energy than making new plastic.

Ambassador initiatives have also impacted 17,418 people in sustainable production and consumption, from making fair trade chocolate to recycling used sports equipment. 'Beat Plastic Pollution' was the theme of this year's World Environment Day.

But do such initiatives amount to 'too little, too late'?

WHY ARE PEOPLE STILL DYING OF PREVENTABLE DISEASES?



Keynote Speaker



LAURENT FARACCI,
Executive Vice President - Global
Category, RB Health

The World Health Organisation said this year that global vaccination coverage has stalled at 86%. They estimate 1.5 million deaths a year could be prevented if vaccination levels improve. Yet there are increasing challenges against the safety of vaccines; in France alone, over 40% of the population do not consider them safe.

Globally, over a million people still die from HIV related causes each year. The lives of three million children under five are lost annually due to undernutrition. According to research in the UK, around 40% of cancer cases could be prevented by lifestyle changes. If everyone routinely washed their hands, the spread of disease and infection could be prevented which would save close to a million lives a year.

Nearly 90% of One Young World Ambassadors believe that education and awareness is the key to preventing disease and ill health. To date, health projects led by One Young World Ambassadors have impacted on 1,342,595 individuals who have been given access to medical care and healthier lifestyles through technology-driven initiatives.

The older generations tend to consider that all young people are at ease with digital tools and processes. Without basic digital education, they are put at the margins of society. Digital and inclusion are not synonymous. – Exclusive sessions in the heart of The Hague –

The 2018 Summit saw a multitude of international institutions open their doors to the One Young World delegation. These Offsite Workshops provided delegates with unique insight into organisations on the frontline of preserving global peace, justice and cooperation..

EXTERNAL BREAKOUT SESSIONS

EUROPOL

Europol is the European Union's Law enforcement agency. Delegates learn how Europol operates within the EU to achieve a safer Europe for the benefit of all citizens by preventing international crime and combatting terrorism through cooperation between authorities of EU member states.

EUROJUST

Eurojust is an agency of the European Union dealing with judicial co-operation in criminal matters among agencies of the member states and is composed of judges, prosecutors, and police officers. Delegates receive insights into how co-operation works across these groups to combat crime.

OPCW (ORGANISATION FOR THE PROHIBITION OF CHEMICAL WEAPONS)

The session presented the mission and activities of the OPCW. With its 193 Member States the OPCW oversees the global endeavour to permanently eliminate chemical weapons and the threat of them with the goal of peace, progress and prosperity. The OPCW won the 2013 Nobel Peace Prize.



MICT (UNITED NATIONS INTERNATIONAL RESIDUAL MECHANISM FOR CRIMINAL TRIBUNALS)

Delegates were introduced to the work of UN IRMCT functions and mandate, with focus on the work of External Relations Office and Outreach Programme.

HAGUE CONFERENCE ON PRIVATE INTERNATIONAL LAW

For 125 years, the Hague Conference on Private International Law promotes peace and justice globally by adopting treaties that pragmatically overcome differences of national laws; promote human rights; and facilitate international trade, commerce and investment .

MUSEON, MUSEUM FOR CULTURE & SCIENCE

Delegates are invited to view the exhibition 'One Planet' which revolves around the seventeen Sustainable Development Goals adopted by the United Nations with the aim of creating a secure, peaceful, just, and sustainable world. Afterwards the session focuses on the Museon's communications about the SDG's to specific target groups and the learn about effective strategies.

EMBASSY OF NORWAY

During this visit to the Royal Norwegian Embassy, Deputy Ambassador Ine Måreng and Minister Counsellor Inge Hausken Thygesen lead a session on the role of the Embassy and of a Diplomat in working on Norwegian-Dutch Relations, Norway's role in several International Organizations and its ambitions for a UN security council.

EMBASSY OF BELGIUM

Belgium is part of the UN Security Council and in this breakout HE Chris Hoornaert, Ambassador of Belgium and former advisor to the Prime Minister of Belgium welcomes Delegates and highlights the role of the Embassy in dealing with global challenges faced across many fields, global security, climate change, human right amongst many others. ambitions for a UN security council.

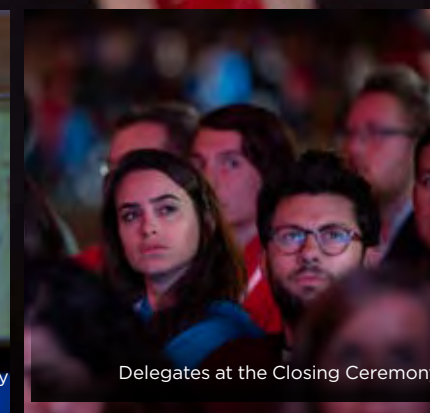

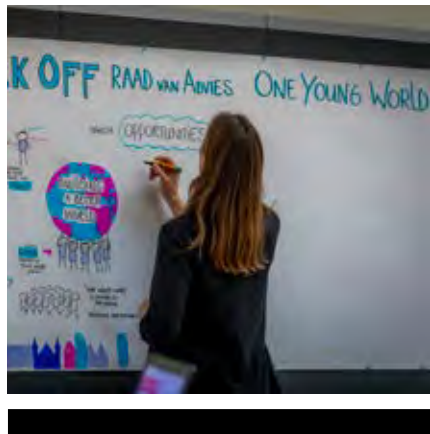
